Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book

Introduction: Health and Health Care in Rural and Frontier Nevada

The Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book – Eleventh Edition contains a wide range of current county level information on the resident population, economy, social environment, population health, health workforce, and the health care delivery system. It includes important data for public policy makers, health care professionals and administrators, rural health care advocates, and equally important, the residents of rural and frontier Nevada. The primary purpose of this data book is to provide the most current and accurate data for these audiences, as well as for those interested in learning more about health and health care in Nevada.

Utilizing over 100 sources of public and private data, most tables provide county level data aggregated at the regional level highlighting important distinctions between rural and urban regions of the state. In some cases, the only available data is regional in nature (e.g., HIV/AIDS prevalence rates). In other instances, the data counts for individual rural and frontier counties are suppressed by the data-collecting agency for confidentiality or other reasons (e.g., teen pregnancy rates). Regardless, the expressed intent of this publication is to highlight important differences among the urban, rural, and frontier areas of the state.

Given the disruption in population health and health care caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, not to mention the state's ever-changing demography, economy, and health care delivery system, some of the data must be approached with caution. In some cases, the information is not updated on a regular basis. Consequently, the "most current" available data likely understates county and regional trends (e.g., occupational and industry estimates). Nonetheless, the information presented in this volume is, to our best knowledge, the most current available.

The *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book – Eleventh Edition* is divided into six major sections containing the most current data on:

- Demographic characteristics of rural and frontier Nevada, including recent population estimates and projections;
- The social and economic characteristics of rural and frontier Nevada, including data on income, poverty, and educational attainment;
- Health insurance coverage in rural and frontier Nevada, including data on Medicare and Medicaid coverage;

- Population health status in rural and frontier Nevada, including age-adjusted mortality rates and numerous morbidity indicators;
- Health care workforce in rural and frontier Nevada, including estimates and projections for many licensed health care occupations across the major regions of the state; and
- Health care resources and the economics of health care in rural and frontier Nevada, including recent hospital financial and utilization trends.

The majority of tables contained in the *Data Book* are organized into two broad categories: (1) rural and frontier counties and (2) urban counties. Rural and frontier counties include Churchill, Douglas, Elko, Esmeralda, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, Lincoln, Lyon, Mineral, Nye, Pershing, Storey, and White Pine Counties. Urban counties include Carson City, Clark County, and Washoe County.

Provider-to-population ratios, insurance enrollment rates, and other population-based ratios and calculations utilize population estimates certified by the Nevada State Demographer's Office for any given year. Some of the population estimates presented in this *Data Book* and utilized in the aforementioned denominators vary slightly from those published later in the same year. Numbers and percentages presented throughout the data book may not add up due to rounding. Dollar figures and estimates are noted below the tables as to whether they have been adjusted for inflation. A complete list of data sources is contained at the end of this report, as well as endnotes providing additional information on data and data sources.

Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book – Eleventh Edition details important differences among rural, frontier, and urban areas of Nevada. These differences impact population health, the availability of hospital and other health care resources, and access to health care services between rural and frontier and urban areas. For example, the age distribution of a county has a significant influence on the health status and health care needs of a population. The population age distribution within a county may affect available resources for local residents (e.g., proportion of county income from Social Security and other transfer payments) and health care providers (e.g., number and percent of Medicare-eligible residents).

All things being equal, rural counties tend to have an older population than urban counties. An older population, in turn, is typically at a greater risk of death and disability than a younger population and uses a disproportionately larger share of health care resources. In general, urban, rural and frontier areas possess important differences in demographics, economics, and social characteristics, which produce differences in health priorities, population health, health-related behaviors, the delivery of health services, and access to health care. For example, research has generally documented higher levels of obesity and smoking prevalence, lower levels of health insurance coverage, and greater barriers to accessing health care services in rural versus urban areas. Thus, it is not surprising that rural areas have significantly higher age-adjusted all-cause mortality rates and cause-specific mortality rates than urban areas.

Defining Rural and Frontier

The definition of what is and is not a "rural" area is no mere academic matter. Indeed, policy makers utilize different, and in some cases competing, classification schemes to target programs, services, and projects to populations in Nevada and the United States. The classification scheme adopted by the Nevada State Office of Rural Health and utilized in this edition of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* emphasizes the important distinctions between "rural" and "frontier" regions of the state. This classification scheme was developed by the National Center for Frontier Communities (NCFC) with input from state health planners and rural health professionals throughout the country.

The Center's classification scheme distinguishes certain areas of the country as being more remote than rural areas. The Center's classification scheme represents an improvement over previous schemes that defined "frontier" simply in terms of population density, where counties with a population density of six or less persons per square mile were defined as "frontier." Frontier counties are different from rural counties by being more remote in terms of travel time and distance from the nearest population centers with more specialized medical care and facilities. Additional information on the Center's classification scheme and methodology can be found at www.frontierus.org.

Map 1 highlights the three urban counties (Carson City, Clark County, and Washoe County), three rural counties (Douglas, Lyon, and Storey Counties), and the remaining eleven frontier counties. It also indicates the location of Nevada's major towns, cities, and county seats. According to population estimates prepared by the Nevada State Demographer's Office, 2.9 million Nevadans or 90.9% of the state's population reside in the state's three urban counties. Approximately 74.3% of the state's population resides in Clark County (Las Vegas metropolitan area) alone and 14.9% in Washoe County (Reno-Sparks metropolitan area). In comparison, an estimated 287,228 Nevadans or 9.1% of Nevada's population reside in the state's rural and frontier counties. The rural and frontier population spreads over 95,431 square miles or 86.9% of the state's land mass.

Map 1 also provides a current snapshot of the major health care services available to rural and frontier residents of Nevada. This map excludes the offices of physicians, emergency medical services agencies, or other individual health providers. While most of the state's tertiary care centers are concentrated in the state's three urban counties, a diverse range of acute care hospital services, outpatient clinics, and medical services are scattered across twelve of the state's fourteen rural and frontier counties (exceptions are Storey and Esmeralda counties where there are no health care facilities). These hospitals and clinics – highlighted in greater detail throughout this data book – provide most of the basic health care received by our state's rural and frontier populations.

Map 2 illustrates the considerable heterogeneity of Nevada's population and geography utilizing "Rural-Urban Commuting Areas" or "RUCA" codes ranging from 1 (the red shaded, core urbanized areas) to 10 (the blue shaded, mostly frontier, isolated areas of the state). The RUCA methodology provides a more fine-grained classification of rural areas applicable at both the county and sub-county units of analysis. Map 2 underscores the concentration of most of the state's population in zip code areas located in the northwestern and southern counties of the state (RUCAs 1-2), and the dispersion of the remaining 10

percent of the population is scattered across a vast geographic expanse of rural and frontier regions of the state (RUCAs 4-10). There are no areas of Nevada with a RUCA code of 3 or 9.


Map 2 also highlights the considerable variation within counties. For example, the urban counties of Clark County and Washoe County contain substantial areas that are rural or frontier in nature, conversely rural and frontier counties such as Lyon and Nye Counties possess comparatively small urban areas or zip codes that are economically integrated with urban centers in the state. Map 3 highlights the unique topography and vast distances separating the state's rural communities from the urban centers. Most rural and frontier communities are located in sparsely populated counties that are considerable distances from the state's urban and tertiary health care centers. The average distance between acute care hospitals in rural Nevada and the next level of care or tertiary care hospital is 109 miles and the average distance to the nearest incorporated town is 43 miles. Consequently, the primary health care delivery issue for rural and frontier residents and communities in Nevada is how best to overcome the spatial isolation and enormous geographic distances that characterize most rural and frontier communities in Nevada.


Nevada comprises the western half of our nation's Great Basin. Ridge after ridge of rugged, brown mountains are broken up with flat sage covered valleys. The Great Basin is a high desert defined by 150 mountain ranges running north to south and earthquake activity second only to Hawai'i. Most mountain passes are subject to very difficult seasonal weather conditions. Most major roads follow the north to south pattern with two major exceptions. U.S. Highway 50 – "the loneliest road in America" – across the middle of the state winds through numerous mountain summits. Interstate 80 curves northeast across the state largely following the railroad tracks built in the 1870's. Travel time from most county hospitals to regional medical centers is thus measured in hours not minutes. Driving long distances is a very daunting task to obtain emergency health care in winter conditions. Helicopter pads are located at all rural hospitals for emergency transport to/from either Reno, Las Vegas, or other emergency care centers.


Map 4 details public and private land ownership in Nevada. Approximately 10 percent of land is privately owned (shaded black). The remaining 90 percent is publicly owned and administered by a wide range of federal, state, and tribal entities. The major administrators of public lands in Nevada are the Bureau of Land Management, Departments of Defense and Energy, and the U.S. Forest Service. The checkerboard pattern along Interstate 80 and the Humboldt River in Northern Nevada highlights a large swath of land owned either by the Bureau of Land Management or the railroad company's land grants.

Map 5 highlights the enormous geographic expanse of the state – Nevada is the 7th largest state in the U.S. – by comparing it with selected northeastern states. Nevada's land mass is approximately 110,000 square miles. By comparison, seven northeastern states with a combined land mass of 47,820 square miles would easily fit within Nevada's borders.





Map 1: Healthcare Resources in Nevada

Section One: Demographic Profile of Rural and Frontier Nevada

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – *Eleventh Edition* provides a wide range of current data on demographic indicators by county and region in Nevada. For additional demographic data and trends, please visit the *Nevada Instant Atlas* at https://med.unr.edu/statewide/nevada-instant-atlas.

Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- The current population of Nevada is 3,276,217 including 302,794 residents in the state's fourteen rural and frontier counties (Table 1.1).
- The population in Nevada is projected to grow from 3,276,217 in 2023 to 3,595,456 in 2033 (9.7%) (Table 1.1).
- Over the next decade, the population of rural and frontier Nevada is projected to grow by 30,203 or 10.0% – 13 rural and frontier counties are projected to increase population, and 1 county is projected to lose population (Table 1.1).
- Currently, 7.6% of the state's population resides in rural and frontier areas, as compared to 92.4% residing in the state's 3 urban counties 2.4 million residents or 73.5% of the state's population resides in Clark County alone (Table 1.2).
- While rural and frontier counties represent only 7.6% of the state's population, these counties cover 86.9% of the state's land mass or 95,431 square miles (Table 1.2).
- Currently, there are 29.8 people per square mile in Nevada. Population density ranges from 0.3 persons per square mile in Esmeralda County to 404.1 persons per square mile in Carson City (Table 1.2).
- Between 2011 and 2021, the population of rural and frontier Nevada increased by 19,389 or 7.0% 11 rural and frontier counties increased population, while 3 lost population (Table 1.3).
- Between 2011 and 2021, 4 of the 6 fastest growing counties in Nevada were rural and frontier: Esmeralda County (21.2%), Lyon County (10.7%), Nye County (10.7%), and Elko County (9.4%) (Table 1.3)

- Currently, 22.1% of the state's population is 17 and under, 61.9% are between 18 and 64 years of age, and 15.9% are 65 and over (Table 1.4).
- In 2022, 10 rural and frontier counties in Nevada had more people aged 65 and over than people 17 years of age and under. Counties with the highest percentage of population aged 65 and over include: Storey County (30.7%), Nye County (29.1%), Douglas County (30.2%), and Esmeralda County (26.5%) (Table 1.4).
- From 2000 to 2020, the median age increased in every county of Nevada the state average increased from 35.7 years in 2000 to 38.2 years in 2020 (Table 1.5).
- In 2020, among rural and frontier counties, the median age ranged from 34.7 years in Elko County to 54.6 years in Esmeralda County; by comparison, among urban counties, the median age ranged from 37.5 years in Clark County to 42.2 in Carson City (Table 1.5).
- The number of residents aged 17 and under in Nevada is projected to increase from 719,017 in 2023 to 752,732 in 2033 an increase of 33,715 or 4.7% (Table 1.6).
- For the next ten years, the growth rate in the population aged 17 and under in rural and frontier counties (7.3%) is projected to be higher than urban counties (4.5%) (Table 1.6).
- The number of residents between the ages of 18 and 64 in Nevada is projected to increase from 2,010,911 in 2023 to 2,223,489 in 2033 an increase of 212,578 or 10.6% (Table 1.7).
- For the next ten years, the growth rate in the population aged 18 to 64 in rural and frontier counties is projected to increase by 3.0%, as compared to an increase in urban counties of 11.3% (Table 1.7).
- The number of residents aged 65 and over in Nevada is projected to increase from 516,986 in 2023 to 640,491 in 2033 an increase of 123,505 or 23.9% (Table 1.8).
- For the next ten years, the growth rate in the population aged 65 and over in rural and frontier counties (14.6%) is projected to be lower than urban counties (25.3%) (Table 1.8).
- The population aged 65 and over is expected to increase in 11 of 14 rural and frontier counties over the next ten years overall, the number of residents aged 65 and over in rural and frontier Nevada is projected to increase by 9,737 or 14.6% through 2033 (Table 1.8).
- In 2023, there are 1,570,128 White people followed by 1,008,409 people of Hispanic origin in Nevada. Other ethnic groups are Black (301,617), Native American (36,106), and Asian Pacific Islander (330,274) (Table 1.9)

- In general, urban areas of Nevada are more racially and ethnically diverse than rural and frontier regions for example, 75.0% of rural and frontier residents are White, as compared to 45.6% in urban counties (Table 1.10).
- Hispanic residents represent 17.4% of the population in rural and frontier counties and 32.5% of the population in urban counties of Nevada (Table 1.10).
- Hispanic residents are a growing segment of the population in all 17 counties in Nevada the percent of the population of Hispanic origin in rural and frontier counties ranges from 5.8% in Storey County to 27.3% in Humboldt County. The Hispanic population in urban counties ranges from 26.4% in Carson City to 33.7% in Clark County (Table 1.10).
- Between 2023 and 2033, the Hispanic population in Nevada is projected to increase by 234,056 or 23.2% – the growth rate in urban counties (23.4%) is projected to exceed that of rural counties (19.4%) (Table 1.11).
- The Hispanic population is projected to grown more than twice (23.2%) than the overall population (9.7%) (Tables 1.1 and 1.11).
- Currently, there are 192,941 military veterans in Nevada, representing 5.4% of the state's population (Table 1.12).
- There are 26,646 veterans residing in rural and frontier counties of Nevada rural veterans represent 13.9% of all veterans in Nevada and 8.1% of the total population of rural and frontier Nevada (Table 1.12).
- The percent of the population who are military veterans ranges from 5.3% in Elko County to 11.0% in Eureka and Churchill Counties in rural and frontier areas, as compared to a range of 5.0% in Clark County to 7.5% in Carson City in urban areas (Table 1.12).
- According to the Veterans Health Administration, the veteran population is projected to decline in every county between 2023 and 2033 the total Veterans population in Nevada is projected to change from 192,941 in 2023 to 163,494 in 2033 (-15.3%) (Table 1.13).
- In 2020, an estimated 811,874 residents of Nevada were born in Nevada (26.8% of the population), 1.6 million residents were born in the U.S. outside of Nevada (53.8%), and 587,808 were born in another country (19.4%) (Table 1.14).
- Currently, rural and frontier counties in Nevada have a slightly higher percentage of native-born residents (29.4%) than urban counties (26.5%). Rural and frontier counties have a higher proportion of residents born outside of Nevada (70.6%) than urban counties (73.5%) (Table 1.14).
- A much greater proportion of foreign-born residents reside in the urban counties of Nevada (20.6%) than in rural and frontier counties (7.6%). The foreign-born population ranges from 2.6% of the total

- population in Eureka County to 11.0% in Humboldt County in rural and frontier areas and 12.8% in Carson City to 22.1% in Clark County in urban areas of the state (Table 1.14).
- Currently, there are 9,987 prisoners in State of Nevada correctional facilities with 2,273 prisoners are in rural and frontier counties, 22.8% of the prison population. Pershing County has 1,401 prisoners, 14% of the state prison population, and 20.1 of the county population (Table 1.15).

Section Two: Social and Economic Profile of Rural and Frontier Nevada

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book* – *Eleventh Edition* provides a wide range of current data on social and economic indicators by county and region in Nevada. Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- In 2020, county level per capita personal income in rural and frontier Nevada ranged from \$37,906 in Pershing County to \$78,416 in Douglas County (Table 2.1).
- The average per capita income for all rural and frontier counties (\$52,626) was below the urban average of \$53,831 and below the U.S. average of \$59,510 (Table 2.1).
- In 2020, rural and frontier county level per capita personal income ranged from 70.6% in Pershing County to 146.0% in Douglas County as a percent of the Nevada average per capita personal income (Table 2.1).
- In 2020, county level per capita personal income in rural and frontier areas as a percent of the U.S. average per capita personal income ranged from 63.7% in Pershing County to 131.8% in Douglas County (Table 2.1).
- From 2010 to 2020, per capita personal income in Nevada increased from \$44,493 to \$53,720 (Table 2.2).
- Over the past decade, per capita personal income in rural and frontier counties increased from \$44,684 to \$52,429 (Table 2.2).
- The Gini coefficient measures the income distribution of a county's population. Coefficients range between 0.0 (no inequality) and 1.0 (high inequality) among a county's population. In general, urban counties possess higher levels of income inequality than rural counties (Map 2.1).
- Rural populations have higher levels of income from government transfer payments (e.g. Social Security) from the government (24.9% of total income) than urban populations (23.1%) (Table 2.3).
- Transfer payments as a percent of total personal income ranged from 15.3% in Lander County to 42.0% in Nye County (Table 2.3).

- Rural and frontier counties had transfer payments from the following sources: Social Security and other retirement (33.0%); Medicare and other medical benefits (33.4%); income maintenance benefits (5.0%); and unemployment and other benefits (28.6%) (Table 2.4).
- Urban counties had transfer payments from the following sources: Social Security and other retirement (23.5%); Medicare and other medical benefits (29.2%); income maintenance benefits (6.9%); and unemployment and other benefits (40.4%) (Table 2.4).
- In 2020, median family income in Nevada was \$74,077 or 92.5% of the U.S. median family income of \$80,069 (Table 2.5).
- Median family income in 2020 among rural and frontier counties of Nevada ranged from \$49,659 in Mineral County to \$93,544 in Elko County (Table 2.5).
- In 2020, 6 of 14 rural and frontier counties had a median family income above the state average of \$74,077 and 5 of 14 rural and frontier counties were above the U.S. average of \$80,069 (Table 2.5).
- Currently, median household income in Nevada is \$62,043 or 95.5% of the U.S. average of \$64,994 (Table 2.5).
- Median household income among rural and frontier counties in Nevada ranged from \$31,500 in Mineral County to \$79,375 in Elko County in 2020 (Table 2.5).
- 6 of 14 rural and frontier counties in 2020 had a median household income above the state average of \$62,043 and 5 of 14 were above the U.S. average of \$64,994 (Table 2.5).
- In 2020, there were 386,817 Nevadans in poverty (12.5% of the state's population) there were 30,821 rural and frontier residents in poverty (10.9% of the population) (Table 2.6).
- From 2010 to 2020, the number of Nevadans in poverty decreased by 6,788 or 2.5% decline in poverty was greater in urban counties (2.6%) than rural and frontier counties (1.1%) (Table 2.6).
- Between 2010 and 2020, the number in poverty increased in 5 Nevada counties, including 4 rural and frontier counties. The percentage in poverty only increased in two rural counties (Table 2.6).
- In 2020, there were 114,374 children in poverty in Nevada (16.7% of children aged 17 and under) there were 8,401 children in poverty in rural and frontier counties (14.4%) (Table 2.7).
- Between 2010 and 2020, the number and percent of children in poverty increased the most in Elko (250; 2.0%) and decreased the most in Nye County (-780; -5.8%). (Table 2.7).
- In 2021, 627,108 Nevadans or 19.9% of the state's population participated in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), including 42,946 or 14.4% of rural and frontier residents (Table 2.8).

- Between 2012 and 2021, SNAP participation in Nevada grew by 271,168 growth was greater in urban counties (257,113; 7.1%) compared to rural and frontier counties (14,505; 4.4%) (Table 2.8).
- In 2021, 432,302 students or 90.7% of the total student population qualified for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program in Nevada, including 38,116 students or 90.6% of the total student population in rural and frontier counties (Table 2.9).
- Among rural and frontier counties of Nevada, students qualifying for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program ranged from 88.7% of the student population in Mineral County to 94.4% in Lincoln County (Table 2.9).
- In 2022, there were 512,973 students enrolled in K-12 schools in Nevada (public and private), including 42,700 students enrolled in schools in rural and frontier areas of the state (Table 2.10).
- In 2022, the average public expenditure on education in Nevada was \$10,112 per pupil among rural counties per pupil spending ranged from \$11,284 in Lyon County to \$34,593 in Eureka County (Table 2.11).
- In 2021, the average high school graduation rate in Nevada was 81.3% the graduation rate ranged from 66.7% in Lander County to greater than 95% in Lincoln and Storey Counties (Table 2.12).
- On average in 2021, the high school graduation rate in Nevada for females is 85.7%, compared to 77.1% for males (Table 2.12).
- In 2020, 86.9% of Nevadans aged 25 and older graduated from high school, 25.5% had a bachelor's degree or higher, and 8.8% had a master's degree or higher (Table 2.13).
- The percent of population aged 25 and over with a bachelor's degree was higher in rural and frontier areas of the state (26.2%) when compared to urban areas (25.5%), and the percent of population with a master's degree or higher was lower in rural areas (6.3%) versus urban areas (9.1%) (Table 2.13).
- In 2022, there were 1,821,864 registered voters out of an eligible voting population of 2,186,632 in Nevada (83.3%), including 186,262 registered voters in rural and frontier counties out of an eligible population of 223,171 (83.5%) (Table 2.14).
- The 2022 general election results underscore important differences between rural and urban parts of the state turnout was higher in rural and frontier counties (81.1% of registered voters cast ballots) versus urban counties (77.9%) (Table 2.14).
- In the 2020 presidential election, rural and frontier counties voted heavily for the Republican candidate (70.3% of ballots cast for the president), while urban counties voted in greater percentages for the Democratic candidate (52.8%) (Table 2.15).

- In 2021, the most prevalent violent crime in Nevada was aggravated assault with 8,654 reported incidents. The most common property crime in Nevada was larceny/theft with 42,835 reported incidents (Tables 2.16 and 2.17).
- In 2021, the rate of reported violent crimes per 100,000 population in Nevada was 414.7 county level rates ranged from 0.0 in Esmeralda County to 855.7 in Storey County, rural rates are lower than urban (Table 2.18).
- In 2021, the rate of reported property crimes per 100,000 population in Nevada was 2,213.3 county level rates ranged from 112.9 in Esmeralda County to 2,327.6 in Clark County (Table 2.18).
- In 2021, there were 13,014 reported violent crimes and 69,459 reported property crimes in Nevada, including 788 violent crimes and 3,951 property crimes reported in rural and frontier counties (Table 2.18).






Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- In 2020, there were 357,885 uninsured Nevadans (11.6%), including 30,587 uninsured rural and frontier residents or 10.7% (Table 3.1).
- In 2020, 13.0% of Nevadans under the age of 65 were uninsured, including 11.7% rural and frontier residents (Table 3.2 and Map 3.1).
- Between 2010 and 2020, the number and percent of uninsured Nevadans under the age of 65 decreased by 231,176 or 39.2% the number of uninsured Nevadans decreased in all 17 counties (Table 3.3).
- Over the past decade, the number and percent of uninsured Nevadans in rural and frontier counties decreased by 22,602 or 42.5% (Table 3.3).
- There were 57,609 uninsured Nevadans under the age of 19 (8.0%) in 2020, including 5,794 uninsured rural and frontier children (Table 3.4 and Map 3.2).
- In 2020, 107,916 Nevadans under the age of 65 and below 138% of the federal poverty level (FPL) were uninsured (18.5%) including 8,294 rural and frontier residents under the age of 65 and living below 138% FPL (16.8%) (Table 3.5).
- Currently, there are 924,349 Nevadans enrolled in Medicaid, including 69,268 rural and frontier residents (Table 3.6 and Map 3.3).
- Between 2011 and 2021, Nevada Medicaid enrollment increased by 555,701 or 150.7%, including enrollment growth of 35,776 (106.8%) in rural and frontier counties (Table 3.6).
- Between 2011 and 2021, Nevada Check Up (Nevada's Children's Health Insurance Program)
 enrollment increased by 3,813 in urban counties and decreased by 195 in rural and frontier counties
 (Table 3.7).


- Currently, there are 565,180 Nevadans enrolled in Medicare, including 73,648 rural and frontier residents (Table 3.8 and Map 3.4).
- From 2013 to 2022, the number of Medicare enrollees in Nevada increased by 151,707 or 36.7% in rural and frontier counties the number of Medicare enrollees increased by 17,474 or 31.1% (Table 3.8).
- From 2013 to 2022, the number of Medicare Advantage (Part C) enrollees in Nevada increased by 133,950 or 103.5% in rural and frontier counties the number of Medicare Advantage enrollees increased by 12,393 or 124.0% (Table 3.9).
- From 2013 to 2022, the number of Medicare Prescription Drug Plan (Part D) enrollees in Nevada increased by 156,010 or 59.9% in rural and frontier counties the number of Medicare Prescription Drug Plan enrollees increased by 17,985 or 55.8% (Table 3.10).
- In 2022, there were 118,765 Nevadans enrolled in the Veterans Health Administration this figure represents 60.7% of all veterans in Nevada. In rural and frontier Nevada, there were 16,105 (59.9%) veterans enrolled in the Veterans Health Administration (Table 3.11).
- During 2022, 83,727 veterans in Nevada used health care services delivered by the Veterans Health Administration this figure represents 42.8% of all veterans in Nevada. In rural and frontier Nevada, 11,624 (43.2%) veterans used the Veterans Health Administration (Table 3.11).

Map 3.3: Medicaid Enrollment in Nevada by County - 2021



Highlights and key findings of this section include:


- Map 4.1 highlights geographic variation in factors affecting health status among Nevada's seventeen counties. The healthiest counties are Douglas (rural), Eureka (rural), Storey (rural), and Washoe (urban). The least healthy counties are Pershing (rural), Mineral (rural), Nye (rural), and Clark (urban).
- Map 4.2 highlights geographic variation in health outcomes among Nevada's seventeen counties. The healthiest counties are Douglas (rural), Storey (rural), Pershing (rural), and Washoe (urban). The least healthy counties are all rural: Churchill, Lander, Mineral, and Nye.
- In general, the prevalence of adult diabetes increased over the past decade with rates slightly higher in rural versus urban counties. In 2019, diabetes prevalence rates ranged from 6.5% in Douglas County to 11.3% in Churchill County in rural areas and ranged from 6.6% in Washoe County to 9.6% in Clark County in urban areas (Table 4.1).
- Over the past decade, the prevalence of adult obesity increased in most counties of Nevada. In 2019, obesity prevalence ranged from 29.6% in Storey County to 36.7% in Mineral County in rural areas and ranged from 30.1% in Washoe County to 31.0% in Carson City in urban areas (Table 4.2).
- In 2019, self-reported physical inactivity ranged from 23.1% in Storey County to 31.8% in Esmeralda county in rural areas and ranged from 21.1% in Washoe County to 27.1% in Clark County (Table 4.3).
- Over the past decade, adult smoking prevalence declined in 12 of Nevada's counties. In 2022, 15.3% of adults in Nevada report that they currently smoke. Adult smoking prevalence ranges from 16.2% in Douglas County to 22.8% in Mineral County in rural and frontier areas (Table 4.4).
- In 2022, 19.5% of adults in Nevada reported excessive drinking. In rural and frontier areas, excessive drinking prevalence ranged from 19.1% in Esmeralda and Mineral Counties to 24.4% in Douglas County (Table 4.5).

- Data from the Nevada High School Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) reveals that youth tobacco smoking in Nevada has dropped to 3.4% of students, however 17.5% of students have used vaping products (Table 4.6).
- According to the YRBS, 14.7% of high school students are sexually active. Sexual activity prevalence
 rates are generally higher in rural and frontier areas of the state, as compared to urban areas. For
 example, 21.4% of students in Douglas County are sexually active in contrast to 13.1% in Clark
 County (Table 4.7).
- According to the YRBS, nearly 1 in 7 high school students report being bullied online (14.9%), 11.2% of students report being forced to have sex, and 1 in 20 reported carrying a gun (4.8%) (Table 4.8).
- The National Survey on Drug Use and Health administered by the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) yields current data on a wide-range of self-reported mental health and substance abuse indicators by region in Nevada and the United States. The data indicate Nevada prevalence rates for adults (18 and older) that are significantly higher than national rates in key areas, such as illicit drug use and marijuana use (Table 4.9).
- From 2010 to 2020, the number of new cases of HIV decreased in Clark County and increased in the
 other regions of Nevada. The new cases of AIDS decreased in all regions of the state. The prevalence
 of HIV/AIDS increased in all regions. (Table 4.10).
- Between 2010 and 2020, sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) syphilis, gonorrhea, and chlamydia increased substantially in Nevada and across all regions of the state. However, STD rates are generally lower in rural versus urban areas of the state. For example, the chlamydia rate in rural and frontier counties (247.4 new cases per 100,000 population) is lower than Clark County (486.4) and Washoe County (536.7) (Tables 4.11 and 4.12).
- New cases of tuberculosis (TB) and TB rates continue to decline in all regions of the state and are
 essentially nonexistent in rural areas of Nevada (Table 4.13).
- Data on maternal behaviors and birth outcomes indicate substantial barriers faced by women seeking prenatal care in rural areas that translate into low birth weight babies and premature births.
 The percent of women receiving prenatal care in the first trimester ranges from 54.1% in Mineral County (rural) to 78.6% in Eureka County (rural) (Table 4.14).
- There is little regional variation in infant mortality rates across rural and urban areas of the state. However, the infant mortality rate in Carson City (13.2 infant deaths per 1,000 live births) is substantially higher than the rural (2.1 infant deaths per 1,000 live births) and state averages (4.6 infant deaths per 1,000 live births) (Table 4.15).
- Over the past ten years, the birth rate declined in 15 of 17 counties, including 12 rural and frontier counties. The highest birth rate was in Elko. (Table 4.16).

- Teen pregnancy rates continue to decline in both rural and urban areas of the state. However, over the past ten years teen pregnancy rates rose in one rural county (White Pine) and declined in all three urban counties (Table 4.17).
- Over the past ten years, the teen birth rates declined or remained flat in all 17 counties in Nevada (Table 4.18).
- The Nevada Department of Education (NDOE) collects data on childhood disabilities by county of residence, including data on autism spectrum disorders, learning disabilities, and speech/language/hearing impairment. In 2022, there were 135.6 disabled children per 1,000 enrolled students in Nevada. Childhood disability rates range from 62.5 in Esmeralda County to 186.9 in Pershing County (Table 4.19).
- In 2020, the age-adjusted mortality rate for all causes of death in Nevada was 915.3 deaths per 100,000 population rates decreased in 6 of 17 counties since 2010 and currently range from 559.8 in Storey County to 1,320.0 in Mineral County (Table 4.20).
- The age-adjusted mortality rate for all causes of death in Nevada increased from 791.0 deaths per 100,000 population in 2010 to 915.3 deaths per 100,000 population in 2020, an increase of 124.3 deaths per 100.000 population or 15.7% increase. (Table 4.20)
- In 2020, the age-adjusted mortality rate for heart disease in Nevada was 213.4 deaths per 100,000 population rates decreased in 10 of 17 counties since 2010 and currently range from 117.9 in Pershing County to 326.6 in Esmeralda County (Table 4.21).
- The age-adjusted mortality rate for heart disease in Nevada increased from 212.6 deaths per 100,000 population in 2010 to 213.4 deaths per 100,000 population in 2020, an increase of 0.8 deaths per 100,000 population or 0.4%. (Table 4.21).
- In 2020, the age-adjusted mortality rate for malignant neoplasms (cancer) in Nevada was 151.1 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 12 of 17 counties since 2010 and currently range from 37.2 in Storey County to 208.4 in Mineral County (Table 4.22).
- The age-adjusted mortality rate for malignant neoplasms (cancer) in Nevada decreased from 170.8 deaths per 100,000 population in 2010 to 151.1 deaths per 100,000 population in 2020, a decrease of -19.7 per 100,000 population or 11.5%. (Table 4.22).
- In 2020, the age-adjusted mortality rate for chronic lower respiratory disease in Nevada was 48.4 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 8 counties since 2010 and currently range from 13.8 in Mineral County to 74.6 in Carson City (Table 4.23).


- The age-adjusted mortality rate for chronic lower respiratory disease in Nevada decreased from 49.8 deaths per 100,000 population in 2010 to 48.4 deaths per 100,000 population in 2020, a decrease of 1.4 deaths per 100.000 population or 2.8%. (Table 4.23).
- In 2020, the age-adjusted mortality rate for lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer in Nevada was 34.3 deaths per 100,000 population rates declined in 9 counties since 2010 and currently range from 13.8 in Mineral County to 65.1 in Esmeralda County (Table 4.24).
- The age-adjusted mortality rate for lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer in Nevada decreased from 48.8 deaths per 100,000 population in 2010 to 34.3 deaths per 100,000 population in 2020, a decrease of 14.5 deaths per 100,000 population or 29.7%. (Table 4.24).
- In 2020, the age-adjusted mortality rate for cerebrovascular disease (stroke) in Nevada was 43.1 deaths per 100,000 population rates decreased in 4 counties since 2010 and currently range from 11.4 in Lincoln County to 60.6 in Carson City County (Table 4.25).
- The age-adjusted mortality rate for cerebrovascular disease (stroke) in Nevada increased from 36.0 deaths per 100,000 population in 2010 to 43.1 deaths per 100,000 population in 2020, an increase of 7.1 deaths per 100,000 population or 19.7%. (Table 4.25).
- In 2020, COVID-19 was the third leading cause of death in Nevada. Heart disease and cancer continue to be the leading causes of death in the state (Table 4.26).
- Leading causes of death and mortality rates vary considerably by region. For example, heart disease mortality rates in Carson County are higher than rural and frontier regions (Table 4.26).
- From 2010 to 2020, age-adjusted death rates for the major causes of death cancer, chronic lower respiratory diseases, influenza and pneumonia were flat or declined in Nevada. Noteworthy exceptions included increased death rates from COVID-19 (100.0%), Alzheimer's (132.4%), essential hypertensive renal disease (103.6%), and diabetes (92.5%) (Table 4.27).
- In 2020, the ten leading causes of death in rural and frontier Nevada were: (1) heart disease; (2) malignant neoplasms (cancer) (3); COVID-19 (4); chronic lower respiratory disease; (5) cerebrovascular diseases (stroke); (6) non-transport accidents, (7) lung, trachea, and bronchus cancer; (8) Alzheimer's; (9) diabetes mellitus; (10)) intentional self-harm (suicide)— all of which vary across regions and to the U.S. rankings (Table 4.28).

In Nevada, there are substantial differences in birth rates, life expectancy, and mortality rates across racial and ethnic groups – differences that persist across all regions of the state. For instance, the birth rate for Whites is 11.5 per 1,000 population, as compared to 55.2 for Blacks in Nevada (Tables 4.29 and 4.30).

Section Five: Health Care Workforce in Rural and Frontier Nevada

This section of the *Nevada Rural and Frontier Health Data Book – Eleventh Edition* provides a wide range of current data on the health workforce by county and region in Nevada. For additional data on the health care workforce and trends, please visit the *Nevada Instant Atlas* at.

Highlights and key findings of this section include:

- During 2020, unemployment rates across Nevada spiked as the result of the pandemic recession.
 In 2021 and 2022, unemployment rates dropped steadily and ranged from 2.9% in Eureka and
 White Pine Counties to 5.6% in Clark and Nye Counties (Table 5.1 and Figure 5.1).
- Over the past decade particularly during the pandemic the unemployment rate in Nevada has consistently been higher than that of the United States, and urban unemployment rates have typically been higher than that of the rural areas of the state (Table 5.2).
- In 2021, there were an estimated 143,845 Nevadans employed in the health sector, including 7,759 in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.3).
- In 2021, Nevadans employed in the health sector earned \$9.6 billion in payroll, including \$450.0 million by rural Nevadans employed in the health sector (Table 5.4).
- There are an estimated 167,032 Nevadans employed in the health care and social assistance sector, including 67,918 employed in ambulatory health care services (40.6%), 48,959 employed in hospitals (29.3%), 24,809 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (14.9%), and 25,346 in social assistance (15.2%) (Table 5.5).
- There are an estimated 7,524 individuals employed in the health care and social services sector in rural and frontier counties, including 3,320 employed in ambulatory health care services (44.1%), 2,291 employed in hospitals (30.4%), 1,075 employed in nursing and residential care facilities (14.3%), and 838 in social assistance (11.1%) (Table 5.5).
- In 2028, 182,656 Nevadans are projected to be employed in the health care and social services sector an increase of 15,624 jobs (9.3%) from 2023 (Table 5.5 and Table 5.6).
- In 2028, 9,108 rural and frontier Nevadans are projected to be employed in the health care and social services sector an increase of 1,584 jobs (21.0%) from 2023 (Table 5.5 and 5.6).

- There are 6,032 licensed allopathic physicians (MDs) in Nevada or 188.0 MDs per 100,000 population, including 212 licensed MDs in rural and frontier counties or 70.8 MDs per 100,000 population (Table 5.7).
- Over the past decade, the number of licensed MDs in Nevada increased from 4,722 in 2012 to 6,032 in 2022 an increase of 1,310 or 27.7%. The number of licensed MDs per 100,000 population in Nevada increased from 171.7 in 2012 to 188.0 in 2022 however, the number of MDs per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties declined from 71.4 to 70.8 during the same period (Table 5.7).
- There are 1,132 licensed osteopathic physicians (DOs) in Nevada, including 63 DOs in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of DOs in Nevada increased by 596 or 111.2% and the per 100,000 population of DOs has grown from 13.6 to 33.5 per 100,000 population (Table 5.8).
- There are 2,723 licensed primary care physicians in Nevada (2,222 MDs and 501 DOs), including 128 primary care physicians (93 MDs and 35 DOs) in rural and frontier counties. The number of primary care physicians in rural and frontier counties is 42.7 per 100,000 population, as compared to 88.9 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 5.9 and Map 5.1).
- There are 1,190 licensed physician assistants (PAs) in Nevada, including 76 PAs in rural and frontier counties the number of PAs in rural and frontier counties is 25.4 per 100,000 population, as compared to 37.9 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 5.10).
- Over the past decade, the number of physician assistants (PAs) in Nevada increased from 589 in 2012 to 1,190 in 2022 (102.0%) and the per 100,000 population number of PAs in Nevada increased from 18.8 to 36.7 during the same period (95.2%) (Table 5.10).
- There are 2,851 advanced practitioners of nursing (APNs) in Nevada, including 131 APNs in rural and frontier counties the number of APNs in rural and frontier counties is 43.8 per 100,000 population, as compared to 93.5 per 100,000 population in urban areas (Table 5.11).
- Over the past decade, the number of APNs in Nevada increased from 674 in 2012 to 2,851 in 2022 (323.0%) and the number per 100,000 population of APNs in Nevada increased from 24.5 to 88.9 during the same period in rural and frontier counties the number of APNs per 100,000 population increased from 17.6 to 43.8 (148.9%) (Table 5.11).
- Almost 2,000 APNs in Nevada have expertise in adult/family care, 406 APNs with expertise in geriatrics, and 244 with expertise in psychiatric care – the vast majority of APNs in these three specialty areas practice in Washoe and Clark Counties (Table 5.12).
- There are 31,152 licensed registered nurses (RNs) who reside in Nevada including 1,871 RNs in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.13).

- Over the past decade, the number of licensed registered nurses (RNs) increased from 20,214 in 2012 to 31,152 in 2022 (an increase of 10,938 or 54.1%) and the number per 100,000 population of RNs in Nevada increased from 735.2 to 971.0 during the same period (32.1%) (Table 5.13).
- The number of RNs per 100,000 population ranges from 103.1 in Eureka County to 1,180.0 in Washoe County the average for rural and frontier counties is 625.2 RNs per 100,000 population, as compared to 1,006.6 in urban counties (Table 5.13).
- There are 3,519 licensed practical nurses (LPNs) in Nevada, including 233 LPNs in rural and frontier counties – since 2012, the number of LPNs in Nevada increased by 662 or 23.2% (Table 5.14).
- There are 130 certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) in Nevada, including 19 CRNAs in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of CRNAs in Nevada increased by 55 or 73.3% and the number of CRNAs increased from 2.7 to 4.1 per 100,000 population. In rural and frontier counties, the number per 100,000 population increased from 4.9 to 6.3 (Table 5.15).
- There are 151 registered nurses with emergency medical services certification (EMS-RNs) in Nevada, including 35 EMS-RNs in rural and frontier counties – 23.2% of EMS-RNs work in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.16).
- There are 9,203 certified nursing assistants (CNAs) in Nevada, including 900 CNAs in rural and frontier counties – since 2012, the number of CNAs in Nevada increased by 1,980 or 27.4% (Table 5.17).
- There are 1,879 licensed dentists in Nevada, including 89 dentists in rural and frontier counties.
 Over the past decade, the number of licensed dentists increased from 1,500 in 2012 to 1,879 in 2022 (25.3%) and the number of dentists in Nevada increased from 54.6 to 58.4 per 100,000 population during the same period (Table 5.18 and Map 5.2).
- Over the past decade, the number of dentists has declined in rural and frontier areas from 34.9 to 29.7 per 100,000 population (Table 5.18).
- There are 1,376 licensed registered dental hygienists in Nevada, including 129 dental hygienists in rural and frontier counties – since 2012, the number of dental hygienists in Nevada increased by 354 or 34.6% (Table 5.19).
- There are 791 licensed alcohol, drug, and gambling counselors in Nevada, including 90 in rural and frontier counties there are 24.0 counselors per 100,000 population in urban counties and 30.1 counselors in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.20).

- There are 1,040 licensed marriage and family therapists (MFTs) in Nevada, including 54 MFTs in rural and frontier counties – since 2012, the number of MFTs in Nevada increased by 371 or 55.5% (Table 5.21).
- There are 478 licensed clinical professional counselors (CPCs) in Nevada, including 28 CPCs in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of CPCs in Nevada increased by 431 and the number per 100,000 population increased from 1.7 to 14.6 (Table 5.22).
- There are 303 licensed psychiatrists in Nevada 300 are in urban Nevada and only 3 psychiatrists are in a rural or frontier county (Table 5.23 and Map 5.3).
- Since 2012, the number of psychiatrists in Nevada increased by 108 or 55.4%, and the number of psychiatrists increased from 7.1 to 9.3 per 100,000 population (31.0%) (Table 5.23).
- There are 342 licensed psychologists in Nevada, including 9 in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of psychologists in Nevada decreased by 26 or 7.1%, the number of psychologists has decreased from 13.4 to 10.3 per 100,000 population (Table 5.24).
- There are 1,889 licensed applied behavior analysts and technicians in Clark and Washoe Counties.
 There are only 102 licensed applied behavior analysts and technicians in rural and frontier
 Nevada (Table 5.25).
- There are 1,354 licensed clinical social workers (LCSWs) in Nevada, including 97 LCSWs in rural and frontier counties there are 32.4 LCSWs per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties as compared to 43.1 in urban counties (Tables 5.26 and 5.27).
- There are 2,640 licensed pharmacists in Nevada, including 138 pharmacists in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.28).
- Over the past decade, the number of licensed pharmacists increased from 2,163 in 2012 to 2,640 in 2022 (22.1%). The number per 100,000 population of pharmacists in Nevada increased from 78.7 to 80.6 during the same period (Table 5.28).
- There are 1,835 licensed pharmaceutical technicians in Nevada, including 128 pharmaceutical technicians in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.29).
- There are 689 licensed chiropractors in Nevada, including 48 chiropractors in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of chiropractors in Nevada increased by 93 or 15.6% (Table 5.30).
- There are 620 registered dietitians (RDs) in Nevada, including 33 RDs in rural and frontier counties – only 5.3% of RDs work in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.31).

- There are 2,478 paramedics in Nevada, including 177 paramedics in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.32).
- There are 76.5 paramedics per 100,000 population in Nevada the number of paramedics per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties is 59.2, as compared to 78.3 in urban counties (Table 5.33).
- There are 4,881 licensed massage therapists in Nevada, including 225 licensed massage therapists in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.34).
- Across all types of licensed medical laboratory personnel laboratory directors, supervisors, technologists, technicians, and assistants the number of licensees and the number per 100,000 population in rural areas of Nevada are lower than those of urban areas. For example, there are 297.3 laboratory assistants per 100,000 population in rural and frontier counties versus 359.1 in urban counties (Table 5.35 and Table 5.36).
- There are 1,165 occupational therapists (OTs) in Nevada, including only 48 in rural and frontier counties. Since 2012, the number of OTs in Nevada increased by 664 or 132.5% and the number of OTs has grown from 18.2 to 36.0 per 100,000 population (Table 5.37).
- There are 349 occupational therapy assistants (OTAs) in Nevada, including only 14 OTAs in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of OTAs in Nevada increased by 192 or 122.3% and the number of OTAs has grown from 5.7 to 10.8 per 100,000 population (Table 5.38).
- There are 461 licensed optometrists in Nevada, including 35 optometrists in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of licensed optometrists in Nevada increased by 112 or 32.1% and the number of optometrists increased from 12.7 to 14.2 per 100,000 population (Table 5.39).
- There are 338 licensed dispensing opticians in Nevada, including 9 opticians in rural and frontier counties. Since 2012, the number of licensed dispensing opticians in Nevada increased by 62 or 22.5% and the number of opticians per 100,000 population has grown from 10.0 in 2012 to 10.5 in 2022 (Table 5.40).
- There are 151 licensed dispensing optician apprentices in Nevada, including 9 optician apprentices in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.41).
- There are 1,747 physical therapists (PTs) in Nevada, including 118 PTs in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of PTs in Nevada increased by 733 or 72.3% and the number of PTs has grown from 36.9 to 54.3 per 100,000 population (Table 5.42).
- There are 692 physical therapy assistants (PTAs) in Nevada, including 36 PTAs in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of PTAs in Nevada increased by 429 or 163.1% and the number of PTAs has grown from 9.6 to 21.5 per 100,000 population (Table 5.43).

- There are 123 licensed podiatrists in Nevada or 3.9 licensed podiatrists per 100,000 population, including 5 licensed podiatrists in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.44).
- There are 1,226 registered respiratory therapists (RRTs) and 365 certified respiratory therapists (CRTs) in Nevada, including 38 RRTs and 25 CRTs in rural and frontier counties (Table 5.45).
- There are 935 licensed speech-language pathologists in Nevada, including 43 in rural and frontier counties since 2012, the number of speech-language pathologists in Nevada increased by 332 or 54.7% and the number per 100,000 population increased from 22.1 to 28.9 (Table 5.46).
- In general, the number of licensed health professionals per 100,000 population is lower in rural and frontier counties of Nevada versus urban areas of the state important exceptions include registered nurse anesthetists, registered dental hygienists, and alcohol drug gambling counselors (Table 5.47).
- Currently, there are 2.3 million Nevadans or 69.7% of the state's population reside in a federally-designated primary medical care health professional shortage area (HPSA) 12 of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county primary medical care HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.1).
- An estimated 247,084 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (81.6% of the population) live in a
 primary medical care health professional shortage area (HPSA) 11 of 14 rural and frontier
 counties in Nevada are single-county primary medical care HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.1).
- Currently, an estimated 2.1 million Nevadans or 64.8% of the state's population reside in a
 federally designated dental health professional shortage area (HPSA) 12 of 17 counties in
 Nevada are single-county dental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.2).
- An estimated 267,300 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (88.3% of the population) live in a
 dental health professional shortage area (HPSA) 11 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada
 are single-county dental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.2).
- Currently, 2.8 million Nevadans or 86.9% of the state's population reside in a federally designated mental health professional shortage area (HPSA) – 15 of 17 counties in Nevada are single-county mental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.3).
- An estimated 302,794 residents of rural and frontier Nevada (100% of the population) live in a
 mental health professional shortage area (HPSA) 14 of 14 rural and frontier counties in Nevada
 are single-county mental HPSAs (Table 5.48 and Map 5.3).




Figure 5.1: Unemployment Rate in Nevada – July 2021 to July 2022






Highlights and key findings of this section include:


- On average, Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals are 56 miles from the nearest hospital and 109 miles from the nearest tertiary care hospital (Table 6.1 and Map 6.1).
- Currently, there are 14 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada serving an estimated population of 287,228 residents scattered over 95,431 square miles (3.0 persons per square mile) – 13 of these facilities are federally designated Critical Access Hospitals (CAHs) (Map 6.2).
- In 2021, there are 299 licensed community hospital beds in rural and frontier hospitals (Table 6.2).
- Currently, there are 7,259 licensed community hospital beds in Nevada, including 245 licensed community hospital beds in rural and frontier counties (Table 6.3).
- Currently, there are 2.1 licensed community hospital beds per 1,000 population in Nevada there are 0.8 licensed community hospital beds per 1,000 population in rural and frontier counties, as compared to a rate of 2.2 in urban counties (Table 6.3).
- There are 4,071 licensed skilled nursing beds in Nevada, including 706 licensed skilled nursing beds in rural and frontier counties (Table 6.3).
- Currently, there are 1.2 licensed skilled nursing beds per 1,000 population in Nevada there are 2.3 licensed skilled nursing beds per 1,000 population in rural and frontier counties, as compared to a rate of 1.1 in urban counties (Table 6.3).
- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined 2,567 employees (FTE) and payroll of \$208.6 million these hospitals had an average annual salary of \$81,281 (Table 6.4).
- Nevada's 25 urban acute care hospitals had a total 28,845 employees (FTE) and payroll of \$2.3 billion urban hospitals had an average annual salary of \$89,151 (Table 6.5).

- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals employed 2,567 individuals in 2021 when the jobs created
 in other businesses resulting from hospital spending are included in the analysis rural and frontier
 hospitals were responsible for an additional 1,520 jobs for a total employment impact of 4,087 jobs
 (Table 6.6).
- In 2021, Nevada's 25 urban hospitals employed 28,845 individuals when the jobs created in other businesses resulting from hospital spending are included in the analysis urban hospitals were responsible for an additional 31,201 jobs for a total employment impact of 60,046 jobs (Table 6.6).
- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals had payroll of \$208.6 million in 2021 when the income created in other businesses resulting from hospital spending is included in the analysis, rural and frontier hospitals were responsible for an additional secondary income impact of \$73.9 million for a total payroll impact of \$282.6 million (Table 6.7).
- In 2021, Nevada's 25 urban hospitals had payroll of \$2.6 billion when the income created in other businesses resulting from hospital spending is included in the analysis, urban hospitals were responsible for an additional \$1.5 billion for a total payroll impact of \$4.1 billion (Table 6.7).
- In 2021, there were 143,845 Nevadans employed in the health sector with a payroll of \$9.6 billion, including 7,759 rural and frontier residents with a combined payroll of \$450.0 million (Tables 6.8 and 6.9).
- Nevada's health sector employed 143,845 individuals in 2021 when the jobs created in other non-health sector businesses because of health sector operating activity are included in the analysis,
 Nevada's health sector was responsible for an additional 151,303 jobs for a total employment impact of 295,148 jobs (Table 6.8).
- In 2021, the health sector in rural and frontier counties of Nevada employed 7,759 individuals when the jobs created in other non-health sector businesses, resulting from health sector operating activity, are included in the analysis, the rural health sector was responsible for an additional 4,304 jobs for a total employment impact of 12,063 jobs (Table 6.8).
- Nevada's health sector had a combined payroll of \$9.6 billion in 2021 and when the income created
 in other non-health sector businesses, resulting from health sector operating activity, is included in
 the analysis, Nevada's health sector was responsible for an additional \$5.6 billion in personal income
 for a total payroll impact of \$15.2 billion (Table 6.9).
- The health sector in rural Nevada had a combined payroll of \$450.0 million and when the income created in other non-health sector businesses, resulting from of health sector operating activity, is included in the analysis, the rural Nevada health sector was responsible for an additional \$145.2 million in personal income for a total payroll impact of \$595.2 million (Table 6.9).

- Currently, there are 14 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada: 6 are not-for-profit publicly owned hospitals; 4 not-for-profit privately-owned hospitals; 3 for-profit privately-owned hospitals; and 1 not-for-profit non-governmental hospital (Table 6.10).
- There are 14 rural and frontier community hospitals in Nevada with 20 provider-based rural health clinics (RHCs). There are also 8 non-hospital based Federally Qualified Health Clinics (FQHCs), and 13 tribal and Indian Health Service (IHS) clinics and health centers (Tables 6.11 through 6.13).
- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals had a combined 8,782 admissions, 34,947 inpatient days, an average stay of 4.0 days, an average daily census of 95.7, and an occupancy rate of 32.0% (Table 6.14).
- Rural and frontier hospitals had \$306.0 million in inpatient revenue and \$982.6 million in outpatient revenue totaling \$1.3 billion in total revenue. Outpatient revenue averaged 76.3% of total revenue (Table 6.15).
- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported an operating income of \$12.6 million. When Northeastern Nevada Regional Hospital is excluded from the analysis, the remaining 13 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported an operating income loss of \$3.2 million (Table 6.16).
- Nevada's 14 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported a net income of \$64.9 million. When Northeastern Nevada Regional Hospital is excluded from the analysis, the remaining 13 rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada collectively reported a net income of \$42.2 million (Table 6.17).
- Nine of the state's 14 rural and frontier hospitals report a negative income from operating activity.
 However, when governmental appropriations and other income are considered (e.g., mining tax revenue allocated to county governments), only two hospitals report a net income loss (Table 6.17).
- In Nevada, Medicare patients account for 53.5% of inpatient admissions, 41.7% outpatient admissions, and 16.0% of emergency department admissions in community hospitals (Tables 6.18 through 6.20).
- Medicare patients in rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada account for 57.0% of inpatient admissions, 42.9% outpatient admissions, and 29.2% of emergency department admissions in rural and frontier hospitals (Tables 6.18 through 6.20).
- In Nevada, Medicaid patients account for 14.9% of inpatient admissions, 13.2% outpatient admissions, and 38.2% of emergency department admissions in hospitals (Tables 6.18 through 6.20).

- Medicaid patients in rural and frontier hospitals in Nevada account for 12.7% of inpatient admissions, 13.5% outpatient admissions, and 30.2% of emergency department admissions in rural and frontier hospitals (Tables 6.18 through 6.20)
- The top 5 types of admissions in rural areas were COVID-19, newborn deliveries, septicemia, heart failure, and pneumonia (Table 6.21).
- In 2019, the top 5 types of admissions in urban areas were psychoses, septicemia, newborn deliveries, COVID-19, and neonates with other significant problems (Table 6.22).

This designation allows small rural and frontier hospitals to receive cost-based reimbursement for inpatient and outpatient services provided to Medicare beneficiaries. As of January 2019, there are thirteen CAH hospitals. CAHs receive financial and technical assistance from the Nevada Rural Hospital Flexibility Program (Flex). The Nevada Flex Program is a federally supported program administered by the Nevada State Office of Rural Health based in the Office of Statewide Initiatives at the University of Nevada, Reno School of Medicine.
